Achromon are a pro-gressive rock group who in recent years have built up a large following in the Limerick region. On Friday 28th they attempt to take Galway by storm. At 4pm they play in UCG and at 6pm they are in O'Reilly's, Salthill, and the same night they play The Cellar. Their style encompasses the old rock sound of Hendrix and Led Zeppelin. Some of their original compositions remind one of the great new wave bands. It will not be Achromon's first time to play in Galway, they played in Smokey Joe's about three years ago. Achromon are Eric Daly on vocals, Paul O'Connor on guitar, Conor Gleeson on bass and Eoin Quill on drums.

Stockton's Wing have been together since 1979. Kieran Hanrahan (banjo mandolin), Paul Roche (flute, whistles, saxo-phone) and Maurice Lennon (fiddle) were all winners of All-Ireland instrumental championships. John Martyn

John Martyn returns to Galway on Friday, 7th March at 8.30pm. He played at The Castle in January of last year but the venue this year is Leisureland. Martyn was born in Glasgow in 1949, an only child. At an early age his mother introduced him to the work of Debussy. Much later he was introduced to the folk scene by Hamish Imlach. He moved to London, was signed to Island Records after being spotted by Chris Blackwell. His debut album was not a commercial success, but it did give him considerably more presence on the club circuit. The Tumbler showed the growing maturity of Martyn's music and his fascination for jazz. Next he recorded Stormbringer, followed by The Road To Ruin album. Four other albums were to follow on the Island label, then he MEDI: ATION

recorded Live at Leeds on independent label in 1976. Island released a further three albums and then he joined WEA in 1981, only to return again to the Island stable in 1984. His latest release is *Piece By Piece*. All of John Martyn's albums have comprised of blues, rock, folk and jazz. As an artist he is eccentric, unpredictable and unique. He is a talented vocalist, musician and songwriter After 20 years on the road and almost as many albums, Martyn has become a key figure in British music. But despite the successes, the bouts of legendary wildness and cult following John Martyn has changed little. Unaffected by the hype and the ephemerality of the music business, he remains at heart a Gaelic folkie, a romantic rock poet and a music professional. Get up and glow

THE repeated accidents/incidents at the British nuclear power station, now known as Sellafield, are becoming a tiny bit terrifying. Apart from the fact that radioactive emissions are known to have carcinogenic effects, there is worry that these emissions also can have the effect of causing Downes Syndrome.
